For Annexation

The city commission's consent to the proposed annexation of four blocks of California Heights at Tehama Street and California Avenue was delayed late yesterday for the second time to permit additional field studies by Mayor Glenn M. DeVore.

Finance Commissioner Arthur L. Hilderbrand announced he is opposed to the annexation on the ground substandard construction and other violations of city regulations have been permitted in the subdivision.

Favored By Two
Public Works Commissioner Fred M. Ashley and Legislative Commissioner Chester H. Cary, however, favor annexation to permit the city to control future building in the area.

The commission agreed that with annexation some temporary structures within the area must be abandoned.

The mayor said he has not had an opportunity to inspect the property and asked for a postponement of action.

The commission met November 4th as the date for an election on annexation of Pearl Heights at East Tulare Street and Maple Avenue after finding four protests out of 62 parcels of property insufficient to halt proceedings.

Contains Four Blocks
The four block area is bounded by East Tulare Street, Maple Avenue, Huntington Boulevard and a line a half block east of Backer Avenue.

An ordinance for the annexation of the Thomas Tract, including three blocks at the northwest corner of Shields and Moroa Avenues was introduced for action next week.

October 16th was set as the date for a hearing on the annexation of a 270 foot strip at Tellman and Clinton Avenues known as a portion of Lot 113, Montpelier Tract.

An ordinance for annexation of a portion of Lot 60, Montpelier Tract, including two blocks at Princeton and Thorne Avenues, also was introduced.

Hearing Is Set For Drunk Driving Suspect

A preliminary hearing for Louis Hernandez, 22, of Clovis, who is charged with a felony hit and run charge, following an accident in which Virginia Malonado, 22, 1918 Tulare Street, was injured, has been set for October 7th at 2 P. M. It will be held by Police Judge George W. Huffman.

Hernandez reported at 12:30 P. M. Sunday to police, saying he was the driver of a car which struck Miss Malonado, a pedestrian, on F Street near Mariposa Street Saturday night about 9 o'clock. She was not seriously injured.

He told the police he did not stop after the accident because he was afraid he would be attacked by a group who gathered. He also said he later the same evening ran into an iron fence.

Soldiers Trek To Glacier Where Airplane Crashed

Army personnel from Hamilton Field, accompanied by a professional mountain climber, left this morning from the high Sierra ranger station above Huntington Lake for Darwin Glacier to investigate the wreckage of an airplane sighted there.

The party, headed by Captains Andrew J. Walton and Robert A. Lewis of the Air Rescue Service, landed at the Fresno Air Terminal yesterday and left in a jeep for the mountain region during the afternoon.

Horses were used for the hazardous trip through the snow fields and to the foot of the towering 14,000-foot glacier. Special mountain climbing equipment was flown here from Hamilton Field.

All Day Trip
Mrs. Edward Greims, the wife of the assistant ranger at the Sierra Forest Station 17 miles above Huntington Lake, said the rescue party took off from Florence Lake this morning at 6:30 o'clock and expected to reach the base of the glacier, 25 miles away, sometime tonight.

Chief Ranger Neil Perkins and Harvey Sauder of the High Sierra Pack Station are guiding the army men into the rugged mountain country with a horse train. An army doctor also is included in the party.

William Bond, a member of the Sierra Club and a student in the University of California, who sighted the wreckage of the plane last weekend also is making the trip to the glacier.

Although he was unable to scale the glacier any great distance, Bond did go far enough to pick-up a pair of tattered khaki trousers and a small piece of the shattered plane.

Mrs. Greims declared the mountain climber will have to chip out steps in the side of the steep glacier to reach the wreckage of the plane, which is near the peak. She said it may be four or five days before the party returns to the ranger station.

The jeep, equipped with short wave radio, will be left somewhere between Florence Lake and the glacier. Mrs. Greims said she believes the rescue group are equipped with walkie-talkie radios and may be able to establish communication with the jeep.

Under Sheriff John W. Ford quoted the army captain as saying the plane may have crashed against the glacier two or three years ago, but that "as far as we can tell from the description of the wreckage and location it never was reported to us."

Bond's description indicates the ship has a twin tail and there is little doubt it is an army plane. Coroner A. M. Yoast said he did not send any of his deputies with the party since the crash is out of his jurisdiction inasmuch as an army plane is involved.

Bail Is Forfeited

Bail totaling \$50 was forfeited in Judge W. T. Walton's police court yesterday by five men charged with gambling. They have been at liberty on bail of \$10 each.

The five, who identified themselves as Robert Hurd, John Karl, James Rip, Cleveland Battle and Jimmy Hanley, were arrested in a raid on the Ace Cafe, 338 F Street, Wednesday night.

Dam and the proposed diversionary works are of such magnitude the river flow below the Friant Dam could be entirely dried up.

Claim Riparian Rights
The plaintiffs declare they have riparian rights to the river, pumping its water for irrigation, farming and cattle raising.

They also contend the operation of the Central Valleys Project unit would destroy approximately 200,000 fish which annually spawn in the water of the river. The complaint states that "a major Pacific Coast salmon run and large schools of bass, trout, catfish, shad and other edible fish have spawned in the river."

The land owners contend the diversion of the river through the Madera and the Friant-Kern Canals would destroy their underground water supply, increase pumping cost to an economically prohibitive level and subject their lands to salt, alkali and other minerals bearing water.

A further complaint is that a commercial sand and gravel mining firm on the river bank would be compelled to discontinue operations because of a lack of water.

State Law Is Cited
They cite a state law requiring the owner of a dam to allow sufficient water to pass through a gateway, over, around or through the dam to keep in good condition any fish planted or existing below the dam. The definition of owner includes the United States, the complaint asserts.

In addition to asking for a termination of present water contracts with the Madera Irrigation District and the South San Joaquin Valley Municipal Utility District, the property owners charge that the approximately 10 per cent of the river flow which has been delivered to the Madera Irrigation District has not been put to use.

The plaintiffs declare that all water of the river is needed by the plaintiffs and other riparian owners for farming and to supply the underground water table.
