For Annexation

The city commission's consent to the proposed annexation of four blocks of California Heights at Tehama Street and California Avenue was delayed late yesterday for the second time to permit additional field studies by Mayor Glenn M. DeVore.

Finance Commissioner Arthur L. Hildebrand announced he is opposed to the annexation on the ground substandard construction and other violations of city regulations have been permitted in the subdivision.

Favored By Two

Public Works Commissioner Fred M. Ashley and Legislative Commissioner Chester H. Cary, however, favor annexation to permit the city to control future building in the area.

The commission agreed that with annexation some temporary structures within the area must be abandoned.

The mayor said he has not had an opportunity to inspect the property and asked for a postponement of action.

The commission set November 4th as the date for an election on annexation of Pearl Heights at East Tulare Street and Maple Avenue after finding four protests out of 62 parcels of property insufficient to halt proceedings.

Contains Four Blocks

The four block area is bounded by East Tulare Street, Maple Avenue, Huntington Boulevard and a line a half block east of Becker Avenue.

An ordinance for the annexation of the Thomas Tract, including three blocks at the northwest corner of Shields and Moro Avenues was introduced for action next week.

October 16th was set as the date for a hearing on the annexation of a 270 foot strip at Telisman and Clinton Avenues known as a portion of Lot 113, Montpelier Tract.

An ordinance for annexation of a portion of Lot 60, Montpelier Tract, including two blocks at Princeton and Thorne Avenues, also was introduced.

Hearing Is Set For Drunk Driving Suspect

A preliminary hearing for Louis Hernandez, 22, of Clovis, who is charged with a felony hit and run charge, following an accident in which Virginia Malonado, 22, 1918 Tulare Street, was injured, has been set for October 7th at 2 P.M. It will be held by Police Judge George W. Huffman.

Hernandez reported at 12:30 P.M. Sunday to police, saying he was the driver of a car which struck Miss Malonado, a pedestrian, on E Street near Mariposa Street, Saturday night about 9 o'clock. She was not seriously injured.

He told the police he did not stop after the accident because he was afraid he would be attacked by a group who gathered. He also said he later the same evening ran into an iron fence.
